Come and Celebrate God's Mighty Acts - July 15, 2018 Edmarc Children's Hospice - 40th Anniversary and the Children's Center - 35th Anniversary

"The kingdom of heaven is like a mustard seed, which a man took and planted in his field. Though it is the smallest of all seeds, yet when it grows, it is the largest of garden plants and becomes a tree, so that the birds come and perch in its branches"

Matthew 13:31 (NIV)

Forty years ago, a mustard seed was planted in what proved to be a fertile field by the members of Suffolk Presbyterian Church. From an unmet need for nursing support in caring for their terminally ill son, two members, Allen and Joan Hogge, and their minister, the Reverend Ed Page, who also was terminally ill with a recurrence of a brain tumor, began an effort which by the end of that year led to the formation of the first hospice in the nation dedicated to the care of terminally and gravely ill children.

The story of the resulting growth from that mustard seed of an idea is one of those stories that can only be classified as one of *The Mighty Acts of God*. From tragic roots in the death of a young father and minister, Ed Page, at the age of 30 and the death of a young boy, Marcus Hogge, at the age of 7 1/2, God inspired the creation of Edmarc Hospice for Children, Inc. to care for the families of terminally and gravely ill children as well as those bereaved by a child's death. In addition, God's leading in the process of creating Edmarc inspired the creation in 1983 of another organization, The Children's Center, which offers care and intervention for at risk children in the western Tidewater area.

Today that single mustard seed has grown into not one, but two trees in the garden providing care and support to families throughout the Hampton Roads area. Currently, Edmarc is providing care and support to 70 families with gravely ill children as well as bereavement support to 50 additional families that have lost children. The Children's Center operates out of 8 centers in four cities in Western Tidewater. They have a professional staff of over 200 who serve over 1200 children annually.

On Sunday, July 15, 2018, we plan to celebrate the leading of God in the initial creation and continued prospering of these two agencies, the contributions of the volunteers and staff, past and present, and recognize the current care being provided by both. Save the date and plan to join us on that day to celebrate the working of God among us.

Update: Choir Director/Organist Search

The Personnel Committee of the church began a search for a part-time choir director/organist in late April as a result of the retirement of Dorothy Lorenz, our former choir director/organist. We have posted this position on our church website, Virginia Pilot Online, and The Tidewater Chapter Organist Guild. We have sent out letters to our local school system's music teachers and band directors informing them of the position and seeking their help. We are also in the process of contacting area colleges that may have music programs. We have also notified the Presbytery office of our need. Not only are we seeking an individual interested in the position, we are also seeking substitutes to play the organ and/or piano on a weekly basis until the position is filled.

As a result of our efforts to date, we have had two individuals inquire about the position. We scheduled interviews for these two individuals, but one withdrew their name prior to the interview. We did interview the other applicant and the committee felt the interview went well. Both parties have agreed to continue our conversation. The applicant did inform us that other churches have requested interviews.

The personnel committee did make a report regarding this matter at the May Session meeting. We ask the congregation for their continued prayers as we continue our efforts to fill this position.

On behalf of the church, the Deacons are honoring the following graduates on Sunday, June 3rd:



Cool the Kids Donations

In early May, one of the two compressors for the church's HVAC system at the north end of the building broke, leaving Apple Tree without air conditioning (AC). Fortunately, Suffolk Sheet Metal was able to diagnose the problem and temporarily make use of one AC compressor for the north end of the building. The FMT discussed options/costs proposals ranging from \$4,300 to \$12,000 and decided to go with the lowest cost option of \$4,300 to replace the compressor with a 1-year warranty.

The good news is the work will hopefully be finished before the dog days of summer set in. The bad news is that this unexpected, major project expense wipes out our planned major projects budget for this year. Our first priority project was to repair the driveway (crack sealing, sealcoating and striping). The driveway's deterioration will only worsen with time without the crack sealing.

We are therefore soliciting "angels" who would like to donate funds to offset this costly project. We are calling the project "Cool the Kids" since this AC unit serves the Apple Tree Day Care. Should you be led to do so, please make your check payable to SPC and add the project name to the memorandum line on your check or let one of the FMT members know. If you prefer anonymity, please let **Jack Stoughton** know.




Dear Member.


