Baptism connects us to God and the community of faith.


The evening will conclude with a monthly business meeting.

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SPOTLIGHT on Elisabeth Writtenberry

Elisabeth Writtenberry, who adopted SPC as her "church home away from home" last fall, divides her time between two states.

She grew up in Manteo in the Outer Banks, where she still has her bedroom at the house she shares with her mother, **Hollie Writtenberry**, and little brother **Gideon**. But for the past nine months, she has been a Virginian, living in Suffolk with her grandparents, **Butch** and **Linda Writtenberry**, so she could study flute at the Virginia Governor's School for the Arts.

The 16-year-old is finishing her sophomore year at Kings Fork High School, where she plays flute in the concert band and piccolo in the marching band. Each day after class, she rides a school bus to Granby Street in Norfolk to practice with the orchestra at the Governor's School, returning to Suffolk about 6:30 p.m.

The talented teenager has big plans for the summer - again splitting her time between the two states. She will be heading to the mountains to work at two church camps, one in Virginia and one in North Carolina, doing what she loves best - sharing God's love with others.

"It's my passion," she said.

She was selected to be a counselor, leading middle and high school students in music,

recreation and Bible study at Massanetta Springs near Harrisonburg in June and Montreat outside of Black Mountain, N.C., in July. Both are affiliated with the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.)

She's been a camper at both, and she's delighted to return in a leadership role, working with campers and counselors from all over the country.

At Massanetta Springs, she will work with younger students for two sessions of a middle school conference. She will be responsible for setting up and leading all of the recreation, but she will also help with Bible studies, discussions, social activities and singing.

"I'll also play my flute," she added with a twinkle in her eye.

Also at Montreat, she will be working in recreation, focusing on stage leadership and energizers for high schoolers. Supervising campers her age doesn't daunt her. She will be partnering with an adult.

"What's really cool," she said, "is that I will be able to go as a camper with my youth group from the Outer Banks."

Elisabeth applied for the post a year and a half ago.

Last fall, she and the three other youth counselors and four adults who will partner with them met on Zoom and in person to plan the theme for the camps and lay out the groundwork for the activities. They have connected on social media and gotten to know one another, sharing joys and concerns.

"We're already practically a family," she said.

Two years ago as a camper at Montreat, she signed up for stage leadership and had to read scripture in front of 700 people. She admits that she was terrified at first.

"I started reading," she said, "and I suddenly felt God's presence."

That's when she realized she felt called to share in ministry

"What else would I want to do?" she asked.

Her summer plans fit in with her desire to go to seminary and eventually become a pastor. Elisabeth has endeared herself to our faith community by sharing her many talents. She joined the choir last fall and enjoys singing. She has volunteered as a liturgist and even asked to do a children's sermon - something members many times her age often refuse to attempt. She has added to our worship by playing her flute in duets with music director Chris Johnson

on the grand piano.

She also has been a vital part of the interdenominational youth group and helped build the Little Food Pantry on the grounds of St. Paul's Episcopal Church downtown and stock it with non-perishable items for people who need a quick food fix. Last year, she started a similar Blessing Box at the Outer Banks Presbyterian Church, her North Carolina church home.

Elisabeth is also looking forward to spending time with her family in Manteo. Her mother, a public school music teacher and youth leader in the Outer Banks Presbyterian Church, also plays the flute as well as the saxophone. Mother and daughter occasionally play duets in area nursing homes.

Butch and **Linda Writtenberry**, who are members of First Baptist Church, Main Street, have been very supportive of Elisabeth's stay with them. They encouraged her to audition for the Governor's School after her mother casually mused that she wished Elisabeth could benefit from the musical opportunity for Virginia high schoolers. They have attended Elisabeth's concerts and driven her everywhere she needed to go until recently when she turned 16 and got wheels of her own. She and "Bandit," as she calls her red sedan, will be back in Suffolk in August when school starts.

What do you like to do in your free time? Practice my flute, listen to vinyl or just talk to my Mom on the phone. She's my refuge. We can be on the phone for hours.

What type of music do you listen to? The Beatles are my favorite! And Elton John and Stevie Wonder.

Does your flute have a name? I call it "Hollie" because it's my mom's. She let me borrow it to have a quality instrument for Governor's School. She said "Just take care of it." And my piccolo is "Hollie Jr."

What has prepared you for working with youth this summer? I have always loved kids. I have been a babysitter, and I have a little brother. Being ten years older than Gideon gave me experience.

Most people don't know that I... am shy.

What brought you to Suffolk Presbyterian Church? I knew, when I moved here, that I wanted to get involved in a church and I knew I wanted to go to a Presbyterian Church. I saw this church, and I decided I wanted to try it.

What do you plan to do after high school? Go to James Madison University, hopefully, and then seminary. I know this Presbyterian ministry is something I want to continue.
