Everyday Gifts of Pentecost

What would you say if I asked you to describe the Holy Spirit? What images come to mind? Could you describe from personal experience who or what it is? Is there a verse of scripture that molds your thoughts on what the Spirit is? I remember during Seminary struggling over these very questions during a Systematic Theology class. We were asked to consider the structure of the Holy Trinity and what part each person played. It was easy enough to put pen to paper when it came to God and Jesus, but the Holy Spirit was another matter. Scripture gives us images of flaming tongues, heavenly doves, and breaths of life, and these are well and good. But what does the Spirit look like to you and me? How does it work? Above all, what can we take from the story of Pentecost to enrich our faith journey in the coming months?

Our story of Pentecost takes off at the end of the Easter season. In many ways Pentecost is the completion of the Easter story. It takes the good news of resurrection and gives the children of God the tools, guidance, and support to witness. The first Pentecost took place during the Feast of Weeks, which commemorated the 7 weeks beginning with barley harvest and ending of the wheat harvest. It also celebrated the giving of the Laws by Moses to the people of God. In the Pentecost story people are gathered in Jerusalem celebrating the many blessings of

God. Acts chapter 2 describes how the disciples were gathered together for this holy feast and the Spirit of God appeared to them and touched them. In verse 2 we hear:

"...suddenly from heaven there came a sound like the rush of a violent wind, and it filled the entire house where they were sitting. Divided tongues, as of fire, appeared among them, and a tongue rested on each of them. All of them were filled with the Holy Spirit and began to speak in other languages, as the Spirit gave them ability."

The same Spirit, or Ruach that was the "breath" with God at creation, with Isaiah and the "seraphim" in his call story, with Jesus in his baptism, is with Christs disciples at that moment, giving life to Jesus's ministry and understanding and hope to his people. God met them where they were and gave them understanding.

The Holy Spirit is a special gift given by God. In Joel 2:28-29 we are told that the Holy Spirit opens us up to God's future. According to the Companion to the Common Book of Worship "The Holy Spirit breaks us out of our preoccupation with ourselves and frees us to serve neighbors, loosens our grasp on possessions, and sets us to loving people. New creation is what Joel is talking about. Pentecost is new creation." It goes on to say that "Without the gift of the Spirit, Christ's church dries up and withers away, and we are left with only our broken selves. With the gift of the Spirit, all

Day of Pentecost Presbyterian Mission Agency

On the Day of Pentecost we celebrate the gift of the Holy Spirit descending in a mighty rush of wind and flame to inspire the church's proclamation of Christ's rising and to empower its mission and ministry to the world. (See Acts 2:1-13; see also Joel 2:28-32.)

The notion of Easter as a season of 50 days ending at Pentecost is patterned after the ancient Jewish festival of seven weeks that extended from the beginning of the barley harvest (on the second day after the beginning of Passover) to the end of the wheat harvest at the Festival of Weeks or Shavuot (see Deuteronomy 16:9-12). The Festival of Weeks later came to be called Pentecost ("50th day") by Greek speaking Jews. In Jewish tradition, Shavuot also marks the giving of the law to Moses at Sinai; this liturgical link may inform Paul's discussions of the law and the Spirit (see Romans 8, 2 Corinthians 3 and Galatians 3).

According to the Day of Pentecost story in Acts 2:1-13, God gave the gift of the Holy Spirit to empower witnesses to the resurrection. Sounds from heaven, cosmic language, the rush of a mighty ruach (wind, spirit, breath) invaded the house in which the apostles gathered, and appeared to them as a burning fire. Tongues of fire touched their nerve centers. A power — the unseen power of God — moved among them and gripped them. The Holy Spirit is unseen, like the wind, which is why the Old Testament calls it ruach YHWH, "the wind, or breath, of God" (cf. John 3:8). The Spirit is the "unseenness of God" working among us.

According to Joel (2:28-29) the ruach is to open everybody to God's future. People young and old will dream and will have visions of hope; they will be able to loose themselves from the way things are now, because God is establishing a whole new economy of creation. The Holy Spirit breaks us out of our preoccupation with ourselves and frees us to serve neighbors, loosens our grasp on possessions, and sets us to loving people. New creation is what Joel is talking about. Pentecost is new creation.

The book of Acts tells the story of the outcome of Pentecost's new creation: people witness in word and in deed to the risen Christ. At the outset, the newborn church immediately tumbled out into the streets to witness to God's mighty works in the languages of people all over the world. By the end of the story, a tiny, Spirit-filled community of faith that broke from its present order has spread across the continents with incredible power to bring new things into being. With the gift of the Spirit, all things are possible. ...

Therefore, on the Day of Pentecost, we celebrate God's gift of Holy Spirit which draws us together as one people, helps us to comprehend what God is doing in the world, and empowers us to proclaim, in word and in deed, God's plan of reconciling all people in the name of Christ (Ephesians 1:10).

Without the gift of the Spirit, Christ's church dries up and withers away, and we are left with only our broken selves. With the gift of the Spirit, all things are possible. A spirit-filled community of faith opens eyes to needs in the world and sees its missing as God's new people. The Day of Pentecost is the climax of the Great Fifty Days of Easter, celebrating as it does the gift of the Spirit to the body of Christ — the church.

So, what do we do with such a special gift? As I was writing this article I thought about my own experience opening presents as a child on Christmas day. Thinking back, some presents had a specific purpose and were only taken out during certain times. Other presents were educational, and though they were good for me, I wasn't always excited to play with them. Then there were the practical gifts, like socks...I used them every day but didn't really think of them as gifts.

So, how do we keep the Holy Spirit as a special gift in our lives and remember its importance and its function as an everyday part of who we are as Christians? I think it starts with us. Take the time each day to acknowledge the living breath of God working through you. You may not know what it looks like or all that it can do, but you do know it's a gift of love from God and without it we would be lost.
