Blockbusters and Life Lessons

Because both movies opened on the same weekend, the phrase "Barbenheimer" has been coined to mark this event. Both movies have been praised for the quality of acting and the themes they present. They come from two different cinematic genres. Barbie is a comedy that playfully highlights the struggles of feminism reflected in today's world. Oppenheimer is a dramatic historic movie, telling the story of theoretical physicist J. Robert Oppenheimer's work with the Manhattan Project and the development of the first nuclear weapon.

There is an excitement beyond the movies themselves. Since COVID, I haven't been to many movies at the cinema. Also, with the convenience of streaming services, we are able to watch many of these movies online in our homes as soon as they hit the theater. My great uncle helped research for the Manhattan project while studying as a chemist at university. He was working on his bachelor's degree at the University of Iowa at the beginning of WWII when Iowa State University transferred him to be part of a team that was researching the development of a "new form of energy". During his time at Iowa State, he felt that he wasn't doing enough for the war effort and enlisted in the Navy. The Navy told him the best way he could serve was to go back to the University of Iowa and finish his degree. Later he served in the Navy before returning to the University of Iowa for his Master's degree in chemistry. It was later while in the Navy that he finally realized what he was really working on. Apparently, it was only after he read about the bombing of Hiroshima that it all sunk in. He put down his newspaper and turned to his wife and said "I was part of this" and then didn't speak of it again.

Today I think about how my great uncle Lawrence felt the moment he realized what he had been a part of. Would he have continued to help research if he knew the future outcome of his work? 


